

ABOUT THIS CLASS:

The Bible story for this Frolic Faith Class is from chapters 6-14 in the book of Exodus. You will read the story "Moses and the Exodus" on pages 12-13 in the Frolic First Bible.

Prep Time

Putting the Story in Perspective

The story of God and Moses is long and exciting, but filled with drama and violence for which kids aren't yet ready. Through a burning bush, God calls Moses to bring the Israelites out of slavery. Moses doesn't think he's the right person for the job, but God chooses him anyway. Pharaoh doesn't want to free the Israelites and refuses to let them go until God sends ten plagues to Egypt. When the Israelites finally escape Egypt, the Egyptian soldiers pursue them. God parts the Red Sea and God's people cross to safety. This story is one of courage, faith, and perseverance with God's help.

A Parent's View of the Story

Being freed from slavery was an event to be celebrated, but the Israelites also realized that their lives were about to change drastically. Having children brings lots of joy and excitement, but it also changes every part of parents' lives—including exhaustion, additional financial burdens, and many unknowns. Parents can relate to the Israelites' adventure into new territory as they reflect on their own adventure through birth, caring for an infant, and raising a toddler. They can remember that just as God was with the Israelites, God is with them on their journey too.

A Child's View of the Story

Young children hear the word "No" a lot, and it will be one of the first words many of them learn to say. Kids will recognize the word "No" from the beginning of the story and may relate to Pharaoh's familiar facial expression. They'll also notice that the story talks about familiar things like frogs, bugs, sickness, and storms, but they will likely not understand the context of these elements. As they hear the story of God rescuing the people from slavery, they will delight in learning that they are God's people too.

Gather Time

If families arrive early:

Encourage parents and children to meet each other. You can also have music playing in the background and a center available for families to explore together before class begins. Select the center that best fits your space and available materials.



Invite families to sign in, choose an item from the basket, and crawl like bugs to the circle.

If you open the door

Welcome

Gather together in a circle. Welcome, families! We are together today to explore the story of Moses and the Exodus in our lives as caregivers of young children. Lead families in singing a welcoming song, tracks 1-3 on the Frolic Faith Music CD, while children make their bugs and frogs hop and crawl. Then teach the ritual from page 1.

Share

Lead families to share about a recent unexpected moment when they felt part of God's family. To start the circle, take the lead in celebrating an unexpected moment, or ask a caregiver who would be comfortable being the first to share. Jot down notes in the space to the right so you remember what to include in later prayers.

Prayer

Dear God,

We give you thanks for the unexpected moments in our parenting journeys. We ask for your presence and guidance in our community gathered here today. Incorporate the unexpected events the caregivers named. Amen.



- Print the Welcome sign and post it at the entrance.
- Place the sign-in sheet and nametags near the door.
- Place the basket of plush toy bugs, frogs, and bug finger puppets on the floor.





Story Time



Hold up the story basket that contains a Frolic First Bible for every family. Place it in the middle of the circle. Lead the story basket rhyme below.

Group Storytelling

Let's hear a story from the Bible! This story is about Moses and the Exodus. It is on pages 12-13. Hold up the Bible Story Poster of "Moses and the Exodus" so everyone can see the picture. Read the story from the back of the poster in a lively, animated way.

Ask these questions and encourage toddlers to respond.

- Who said "no"?
- Moses' name begins with a "mmmm" sound. Let's say "Mmmmoses" together.
- Show me with your hands what happened to the water in the sea.
- Moses helped God's people. Who helps you?

Ask families to point to the sentence on the bottom of page 13. Point to all the people in the room as you repeat this statement. **You are one of God's people.** Make sure you point to yourself and say, **I am one of God's people.**



Sing Together

Sing this song, track 24 on the Frolic Faith Music CD, to invite families to take a Frolic First Bible from the basket.

Time for a story. Come get a book. Open the pages. Let's take a look.

If you want to sing together, sing "Halle, Halle, Hallelujah," track 14 on the Frolic Faith Music CD.



One-on-One Storytelling

Now it's time for you to read the story together. Give

time for caregivers to read the book to their children. Once they've read the story "Moses and the Exodus" together on pages 12-13, offer these tips.

For Infants

Touch your infant's toes while saying, **"You are one of God's people."** Touch your infant's belly while saying, **"You are one of God's people."** Touch your infant's nose again saying, **"You are one of God's people!"**

For Toddlers on the Move

Together point to the different characters in today's story. Say, "No," like Pharaoh. Stand safe like Moses. Leap like the frogs. Crawl like the bugs.

For Talkative Toddlers

Together count all the children who are God's people in our story today. Next count all of God's people in your learning area.



Caregiver Conversation

Sometimes being God's people means making big changes in our lives. Ask parents to connect today's story to a time when they had to make a scary change such as a career move, a move to a new house or city, or a decision to join a church, knowing that in the long run, it was for the better.



Choose an instrument such as a tambourine or chime and play it to get the children's attention. You can also say or sing the song at right.



Sing this song, track 25 on the Frolic Faith Music CD, to transition to Play Time.

Play Time

Time to play! Choose the centers that best fit your space and materials. Make photocopies of the center descriptions on pages 8-15, fold them in half, and post them near the materials for parents to reference. Caregivers and children can explore the centers at their own pace. Caregivers may also use this time to connect with each other while their children play and discover.

1 Let's Color Together

This center supports **coloring skills**. For toddlers.

Supplies: Moses and the Exodus Coloring Page on page 16, crayons, and blank paper Make copies of the Coloring Page and place on a low table with crayons and blank paper.

2 Let's Read Together

This center supports early literacy. For infants and toddlers.

Supplies: Frolic First Bible, Frolic books, board books, letter blocks, and cushions or pillows

Create a cozy reading nook with pillows or cushions. Display the Frolic First Bible and other books. Place letter blocks nearby. Point out that *M* is for *M*oses.

3 Jumping Frogs

This center supports **physical development**. For older infants and toddlers.

Supplies: An open, padded space and painter's tape

Tape circles on the floor to make lily pads. Crouch down on the floor and jump like a frog from one lily pad to another.

4 Bug Prints

This center supports cognitive development and creativity. For older infants and toddlers.

Supplies: Large plastic bugs and toddler play clay

Make individual balls of play clay on a toddler-sized table. Set out plastic bugs.

5 Sea Walk

This center supports cognitive and physical development. For infants and toddlers.

Supplies: Two beach towels (preferably blue)

Spread beach towels on the floor next to one another. Sit on one side of the towels and ask another adult to sit on the other side. Count to three and part the towels, making a path. Encourage children to walk or crawl through the parted sea.

6 Apart and Together

This center supports language, cognitive, and physical development. For infants and toddlers. Supplies: No supplies needed.

While sitting on the floor, say "apart" with separated hands. Then say "together" while closing your hands. Repeat many times with bounce and rhythm. Ask others to join you.

7 Sea Drops

This center supports **fine motor development** and **emergent science concepts**. For older infants and toddlers.

Supplies: Blue food coloring, eyedroppers, water, and small, unbreakable containers Fill some containers halfway with water. Put color in the other containers with the droppers.

8 Packing Station

This center supports **cognitive**, **emotional**, and **social development**. For infants and toddlers.

Supplies: Small suitcases, plastic food, and dress-up clothes

Place items in an area in the room. Encourage families to pack for a long journey.



Send Time

Prior to the end of Play Time give the children a 2-minute notice that it is almost time to stop playing. At the end of 2 minutes play the same instrument that you played at the beginning of Play Time to get the attention of families.

Summing It Up

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Thank you for reading and playing with us today! It was so much fun to learn about Moses leading God's people to safety. Remember, you are one of God's people too! What will you remember about today? Invite any children and caregivers to respond.

Closing Ritual

Invite caregivers to engage in the ritual from page 1 with their child. Then lead the group in a closing song, such as "Praise God, Praise God," track 17 on the Frolic Faith Music CD.

Prayer

Begin today's prayer with folded hands.

Dear God,

We are your people, (Point to self.) Hooray, hooray! (Reach up high.) We are your people, (Point to self.) Today, today! (Reach up high.) Amen.



Sing Together

Sing this song, track 26 on the Frolic Faith Music CD, to call everyone back to the circle.

Play time is over For you and me. Come back to the circle— One two three!

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
